

OLD BUSINESS

D Dock Rebuild

The construction company is running two weeks behind schedule; the scheduled finish date is now the end of May. A discussion of fiberglass fingers vs. pressure treated/micron decked fingers ensued. Fiber-Docks agreed to allow the return of one finger at the end of one year if we are dissatisfied for a full refund. Motion to purchase one 3' x 36' fiberglass finger from Fiber-Docks at a cost of \$4,169. Smith/Jones. (MSP).

Sailing Education Ad Hoc Committee

Jim Hachman reported on meeting held March 27 with John Walker, Kristi Farrell, Debbie Walker and Al Farnum.

The Committee would like clarification of their responsibilities? Are they to advise the Board on purchases of equipment based on the Club's goals for programs? The Committee could be the determiner of program goals. Through recommendations the Committee could determine the future of sailing education at the Club (i.e. a program's scope, recommend new programs; oversee integration of training programs with other SSC activities, establish program structure and budgets based on proposals, staffing, etc.).

Is this Committee to oversee the direct maintenance of Santana 22s, Flying Juniors, Prams, El Toros? No funds exist in the Learn to Sail Grant for repair/maintenance of equipment.

It is difficult to recommend the hiring of personnel for Learn to Sail; the funding available has not been determined. The Committee would like a review at completion of a program outlining lessons learned, performance, costs and budget for consideration in the next year's program. Because of the diversity of the items this committee will oversee, it may become necessary to make it a standing committee to insure continuity from year-to-year. Once the scope of the Committee is established, additional committee members shall be solicited.

Werner Memorial Bench Plaque

Bob Winter went to the bronze foundry to obtain an approximate cost of a cast plaque (\$125). If Mrs. Werner is in agreement and the House Committee approves, the Board will authorize the expenditure.

NEW BUSINESS

Length of Board Meetings

Board meetings have been lengthy. The Board has agreed to start their meetings at 1800 (6:00 p.m.) in the future. The Board hopes to adjourn at an earlier hour.

Port Captain Vacancy

Chris Shepherd has resigned as Port Captain. Commodore Debbie Walker will act as interim Port Captain with the assistance of Director Chuck Jones and Director Mike Stefani until the May 13th Board Meeting.

Committee Liaison Responsibilities

Board members are reminded to present a written



report, which includes updates of projects in progress, new items and the date of the next committee meeting. The Commodore should receive reports by the Thursday prior to the Board meeting. E-mails to fellow board members with information prior to Board meetings could expedite issues. Learn to Sail Staffing

In 2002 Learn to Sail employed seven people; the 2003 grant will be substantially less. It is proposed to employ four people. This staffing seems inadequate for the program. A need to purchase boats means fewer dollars for staffing. If El Toros can be adequately repaired they can be used for advanced programs. However, if members show no interest in continuing these programs, perhaps they are no longer needed. Learn to Sail should put together a budget and present it at the May 2003 Board meeting. The Board would like to know the potential return on investment with dinghy purchases for the secondary sailing program.

An Evening with Bruce Schwab

As I write this article Bruce Schwab has just left Salvador, Brazil as he sails to complete the last leg of the Around Alone on Ocean Planet, an Open 60.

Bruce began this adventure in September of 2002 from Newport, Rhode Island after much preparation. This race consist of five legs,



the course spanning over 28,755 miles. Bruce is one of only two Americans competing in this race. His four year program culminates in the Vendee Globe, a solo, non-stop race around the world in 2004. Bruce's goal is to be the first American to officially complete the Vendee Globe.

Bruce grew up living in Puget Sound, is a professional rigger and ran the largest rigging shop in California for nearly 20 years. While working as a rigger he completely remade Rumbleseat, a 1930 vintage 30 sq. meter on which he sailed to victory in 1996 during the single-handed Transpac race. In 1998 Bruce skippered Azzura, a custom 30 foot boat, to victory in the double handed class of the Pacific Cup race to Hawaii. Bruce has also won many back-to back victories in the Dble Handed races from San Fran to the Farallone Islands.

I had the opportunity to meet Bruce many years ago while I was walking the docks, looking at boats harbored in Alameda. As I walked along, alone, I noticed a beautiful boat. A young man was on the boat, I said hello, and commented on the beauty of this sailboat. The young man invited me aboard and proceeded to give me a very extensive tour of this sailboat named Azzura. As I said good bye, I was taken by the graciousness of this person, someone who had taken the time with me and I didn't even look like a sailor!. I met back up

with Ernie and a friend who were in another area of the harbor. Ernie asked me if I knew who I was talking with, I didn't. He told me that it was Bruce Schwab. I had read articles about Bruce and knew about his boat Rumbleseat. I was thrilled that I had met this nice, accomplished sailor. Sometime after that I had the opportunity to send Bruce a note via email and tell him how pleased I was to have met him and how gracious he was. I appreciated the fact that he had taken the time with this stranger. Bruce responded with a very nice note and we decided we were now friends! Bruce and I have had some contact during his Around Alone adventure.

On July 26, 2003 Bruce will be visiting all of us here at our beautiful club. The evening will consist of a talk and pictures of the Around Alone adventure. He also plays the guitar and he will play some songs for us on this evening. I have told Bruce about the beautiful club and the wonderful people who belong to the SSC. He is looking forward to meeting everyone.

I hope you will mark your calendars now for July 26th, An Evening with Bruce. More details to follow. Any ideas and assistance for this upcoming event will be welcome.

LIME CHICKEN AND PASTA SALAD

¹/₂ cup soy sauce

¹/4 cup lime juice

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 tablespoon sesame oil

1 tablespoon minced fresh lemongrass

1 tablespoon lime zest

2 teaspoons minced fresh ginger

1 clove garlic, minced

1 jalapeno pepper seeded and minced

¹/₂ pound pasta spirals, cooked

1 lb. skinless-boneless chicken breasts, cooked and diced

6 to 8 broccoli florets, blanched

1 red bell pepper, seeded and slivered

¹/₂ cup slivered water chestnuts, canned

In a large mixing bowl, combine the soy sauce, lime juice, vegetable oil, lemongrass, lime zest, ginger, garlic, and jalapeno pepper. Add the pasta, chicken, broccoli, bell pepper, and water chestnuts and toss well. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour and toss again before serving.

This can be made ahead of time at home, placed in a 1 gallon zip-lock freezer bag and then kept in the boats ice box.

At the March Board meeting, Philip Berolzheimer was honored with a Lifetime Membership for his years of strong support and dedication to the Stockton Sailing Club. The club presented him with a plaque during the Opening Day celebration.

Phil became an active member of our club back when the club house was a barge at Ladd's. Phil served on the board of Directors several times and was Commodore in 1964. Back in the sixties, he and Jim Van Dyke help create the Challenger and 5.5 Meter fleets by becoming a dealer for Columbia. To promote the racing program, they sold the boats to members at cost.

Over the years he has supported and donated much to the Club. Long time members remember Phil donating a load of lumber to build a sailing dock for El Toros when the club was still at Ladds. Phil was a contributing member of the "Century Club", a group of members who donated money to build the small crane. He contributed the funds to purchase the bookcase in the library as well as many of the books in our sailing collection. Corporate sponsorship by Duraflame provided financial backing for the South Tower race in the late 80's at the same time they were also sponsoring Tom Blackhaller's America's Cup challenge.

In resent years, Phil has continued to support the club. His strong interest in the history of the club led to him providing seed money for the club's historical video, produced by Mike Bennett. .He is a major contributor to the Olympic Star campaign of Austin Sperry, the son of long-time member Brooks Sperry.

Did You Know

Have you recently checked your running lights to see if the starboard light is green and the port light is red? Now check to see if the lenses have faded. If they do not show a true red or green, it is time to replace them.

Under Rule 22, for a vessel less than 12 meters (39.4 feet) the minimum visibility range of a masthead light is 2 miles, a side light 1 mile, and a stern light 2 miles. Under the best of conditions on a dark night, side lights low to the water not showing minimum range would make avoiding a collision by another vessel difficult.

Also, check to be sure that all navigation lights display an unbroken light through the prescribed arcs of visibility. All-around lights may not be obstructed more than 6 degrees by items such as a collapsed canopy, Bimini top, mast , Jackstaff, trolling motor, etc.

Batteries also need to be checked so that lights so operated have the appropriate minimum range of visibility. Happy Safe Sailing, Al

HOUSE COMMITTEE REPORT

April 24th, 2003

THE RAZOR'S EDGE Welcome Racers -

Opening Day saw a great new event that will continue over the new few months - dinghy racing!

For those who took the time (and courage) to race - congratulations. There is no better way to put into action, desire and personal skill levels (such as they are) than to race a small boat.

Boat trim is critical in small boats; your sail trim and your body weight affect the bow-nose down upwind and downwind. Watch the leading boats in all racing classes and try to do the same as the other competitors out in front of you. And remember every effort is rewarded instantly in a small racing dinghy. If you are in doubt as to how to setup your boats sails, try snug-no wrinkles in your sail for getting started. As the wind builds in strength, then add more snugness to flatten (depower) the added wind strength.

Boom vangs (to hold the boom down) should be set so that the boom appears level (not with the boom end pointed up in the air). This is a big help. With wind increasing, check your halyard. It will appear that the sail is not all the way up by a few inches. If you can get a few clicks up on your halyard, do so. If not a down haul (known as a cunningham adjustment) will tighten the main by down leverage on the luff or leading edge of the mainsail. The sail will look better and will sail faster. Try it and you will see the difference.

I can't remember exactly when or where but after one particularly memorable dinghy race I won, I was asked what one tip or piece of advice about sailing do I feel would reward the old as well as new sailor - sailing downwind - be it with or without a spinnaker and could I prove it in 50 works or less!

EXAMPLE: DDW (dead downwind) when you must pull in the jib slightly or ease the pole forward, the boat speed will increase. We want more speed right? WRONG! If you are being lifted, to jibe back because as you lift, you are sailing away from your downwind bottom mark.

That's my tip this month Until the next big race, I hope to see you all in the Winner's Circle
