LONG TIME MEMBER-DOCTOR HARLEY TINKLE



It is a great pleasure to tell you about Harley who is now 95 years old. He has been a member of the SSC since the 1950's or since the dinosaurs became extinct.

He started racing with Ray Drew and they raced all over the United States. He built his own Windmill sailboat, as did others in the club. His boat was named "Sunkist". Harley was also big on wind surfing and rowing. He also served as SSC Port Captain.

Born in 1925 he was raised in San Diego. His dad was a WW-1 veteran. At 16 years old he started working at Consolidated Aircraft on B-24's. He went to San Diego State and then transferred to Berkeley. That is where he graduated as an

eye doctor (OD). He worked as an OD all his life until retiring from Kaiser.



Harley developed an interest in drawing and painting later in life. Among many of his projects he designed some Delta Ditch Run shirts and posters. He has done hundreds of paintings and drawings with a sailing or water theme. Many club members have purchased some of his pieces.

Harley lives with his daughter in Sacramento now. Some of our members still have contact with him and say he is doing fine.

DISCOVERING THE ECOLOGY OF THE DELTA

THE MALLARD (Anas platyrhynchos) by Marie-Odile Noel-Goodman

Spring is the reproduction season for most of the birds, and our sailing club is definitely a place of choice to do pretty interesting bird watching! The star species of the month is the Mallard duck, with a female that laid her eggs on Marvin McDougal's boat... three times.

Mallard pairs form in the fall, as a result of successful courtship behaviors performed by both the male and the female – some elegant moves known as Head-Pumping, Head-Up-Tail-Up, Grunt-Whistle and Nod-Swimming. In Spring, the breeding season, pairs can be seen circling together low over the habitat in the search for a nesting site. As the proximity of water is an essential feature for raising ducklings, Marvin's sail-boat appeared to a Mallard couple to be a perfect spot. About two months ago, the female made her nest in the lines laying on the bow of Marvin's boat. She laid about 16 eggs (a big clutch for the species!) but, unfortunately, many of the eggs fell off the bow and broke on the deck below. No duckling was seen and the female left the bow after about a month... to come back a couple days later to lay a second clutch! The bets are open: will we witness some of her eggs hatch on Marvin's bow? If so, the ducklings will have a yellow and brown, fluffy plumage with distinctive dark brown streaks by the eyes. They won't be able to fly yet, but they will be fully capable of swimming only a couple hours after they hatched! This ability is particularly important to move quickly under a vegetation cover and hide from predators if needed.

The Mallard is probably the most familiar of all ducks, and is the main ancestor of all domestic duck breeds, except the Muscovy duck. The male is easily recognizable with his iridescent-green head and bright yellow bill. The female is mottled brown with an orange-and-brown bill. Both sexes have a white-bordered violet patch of feathers on the wings, called the speculum. This speculum is prominent in flight and is a good way to identify the female, which is otherwise dull – like other female ducks, she has to blend in the environment to keep her eggs and ducklings out of the eyes of the predators.

Mallards can be found in almost any wetland habitats, permanent or ephemeral, such as marshes, beaver ponds, lakes, city parks, but also roadside ditches, pastures and fields. Across much of the United States, they occur year-round. However, populations that breed across Canada and Alaska migrate along well-known flyways for wintering in the southern United-States and northern Mexico. They are strong flyers; migrating flocks of Mallards have been estimated traveling at 55 miles per hour! As a result, with a 50 mph tail wind, migrating mallards are capable of traveling 800 miles during an eight-hour flight. Although their life expectancy in the wild is estimated at 5-10 years, the oldest known Mallard was at least 27 years, 7 months old when he was shot (harvested, for you hunters) in Arkansas in 2008. He had been banded in Louisiana in 1981.

Mallards can be pretty tame and it is tempting to feed them. However, some individuals that are used to being fed can become needy and aggressive towards humans, so it is a risky game. If you do feed the ducks, they should be fed foods that are similar to the insects, mollusks, seeds, grains, and plants they will forage for on their own. **Bread, crackers, and other bread-like foods are not a good option to feed ducks and other waterfowls.** They have little nutritional value, can harm ducklings' growth and can lead to overweight adults that have a hard time flying. Other options are much more healthy and nutritious for them, like oats, rice, seeds, sweetcorn, peas, grapes cut in halves or chopped greens. Remember, a healthy duck is a happy duck!




