

Both have served on the board. Richard is a past commodore and Pam is actively serving as secretary as well as the clothing merchandise manager.


Lastly, they have two grown children and some grandchildren who have participated in the learn to sail program.

For us the Bay Trip began on October 2 when Tom Lueck on Sir Leansalot arrived at the Richmond Yacht Club to join us. We enjoyed one of their wonderful Saturday night dinners. But be informed! No one is allowed in the club house without a vaccination card on a lanyard around your neck and a mask. On October 3 the Stockton Sailing Club had five boats on the bay, Tim Callahan and Kariss on Idle Minds, Tom Lueck on Sir Leansalot, Patrick Anderson and son Arran on O'Hana, Pam and Richard Wright on Legacy, and Bill Miller and Ruthie Howell on Natsukaze. Sir Leansalot's guests were Carla Brown, Jennifer Cavagnaro and husband, Joe, and Valerie and Joe Watterson. (The husbands were known on aboard as Joe "Jr" and Joe "Senior") When everyone was back in the South Beach Harbor and the guests had departed we went to dinner at Delancy's . It is a must do when in South Beach. Excellent food and worthy of support.

On October 4 Ruthie, Bill, Tom, Richard and I had breakfast at a nearby popular place just up from the marina. Then we took Munni down to Pier 39 to play tourist. We shopped, lunched on bowls of chowder on the pier, stopped at a drugstore (while Bill and Ruthe made a better choice by going to Ghirardelli's), and caught the Munni back to the harbor. Tim and Kariss went on into Richmond, Tom sailed to Angel Island, docked and hiked to the top of the island to watch from there. (Tom gets the prize for his brilliant plan, which he did not share with the rest of us). Osprey sailed to Sausalito for the night. We took down sails and motored around Angel Island but the wind was strong and the water choppy and it had gotten cold so this first mate requested we just head to Richmond which is what we did. We dined at the Richmond club house with Tim, Kariss, and Tom.

October 9^{th:} The Idle Minds, Sir Leansalot, and Legacy left the RYC and headed to Racoon Strait. Everything was in our favor and we arrived at the gate just over an hour and a half, a record if there ever was one! The meet up time was 9:00am and we were there at 7:30ish. We circled until the appointed time and were joined by Ed and Allyson Montague on Lil Honu and Stuart and Kristi Farrell on Osprey. We were off. It was calm waters. The trip down to Half Moon Bay was very nice. We arrived at Pillar Point Marina at 2:00pm. Ever since the 6th of October we had been watching the weather forecast for October 10. It didn't look good. High winds predicted. We all decided that we would enjoy dinner at Ketch Joanne's, turn in and prepare to return to the San Francisco Bay early the next morning before the Sunday afternoon winds could build. This is when our paths crossed with Patrick and his son, Aaron. They had made Half Moon Bay a day earlier. They joined us on Sir Leansalot for Happy Hour and we had a great time. Lots of photo ops there! Check with Patrick. The next morning at 7:00am Idle Minds, Sir Leansalot, Legacy, Lil Honu, and Osprey left Pillar Point together. The water was strong with rolling waves, sideways. For those that had not experienced this before it was a bit uncomfortable, and a bit of work. About 40 minutes from the Gate Farrells notified us that they could not longer see Lil Honu behind them and Lil Honu was not answering their radio. I checked my phone below and sure enough, Allyson had called to explain their motor had died and Ed was in the process of changing out a fuel filter....while underway. Waiting, Waiting to hear. Idle Minds headed to the Oakland Yacht Club for a few nights. When Lil Honu arrived at the Gate Legacy, Osprey, and Lil Honu headed to Richmond where we tied up on end ties and hunkered down. We had great conversation at the Richmond Yacht Club dinner that night. On the 11th of October we woke to winds. The Farrells and Wrights walked into Point Richmond for a grocery store stop and lunch at the pub. That was delightful. Back to the boats to relax. A potluck dinner was planned on board the Legacy later. The Legacy was cleaning out their refrigerator, planning to head up delta the next day. DISCOVERING THE ECOLOGY OF THE DELTA

THE WILD TURKEY (Meleagris gallopavo) by Marie-Odile Noel-Goodman

What a good time of the year to talk about our beloved Thanksgiving and Christmas bird, the Wild Turkey! This animal, pardoned by the US president each year, is eaten by an estimated 88% of the population on Thanksgiving. Some 46 million turkeys are commercially raised each year in the United States. Many wild ones are hunted as well, the Wild Turkey being the second most-sought game after deer. The large number of these birds in the wild allows for hunting seasons throughout the United States, but it hasn't always been the case.

Native from Mexico, where they were already domesticated, Wild Turkeys were brought to Europe by explorers in the early 1500s. They quickly became popular on European menus thanks to their large size and rich taste from their diet

of wild nuts. Therefore, when English colonists settled on the Atlantic Coast, they brought domesticated turkeys with them. Through the early twentieth century, because of hunting pressure and habitat loss, the populations dwindled drastically. People looking for ways to reintroduce this game bird first tried releasing farm turkeys into the wild, but those birds didn't survive. In the 1940s, people began catching wild birds and transporting them to other areas, allowing Wild Turkeys to spread to every state of the US, except Alaska. The global breeding population is now estimated to be about 8 million birds, with almost 90% of them living in the U.S.

The Wild Turkey is one of our largest and heaviest birds, with both females and males reaching similar lengths (43.3-45.3 in), weights (2.5-10.8 kg) and wingspans (49.2-56.7 in). They are plump and dark-colored overall, with a bronze-green iridescence. The wings are boldly striped with white, and the rump and tail feathers are tipped with rust or white.



The head is small, with bare skin that varies from red to blue or grey. The male's head features red wattles.

Turkeys live in flocks – young and females together, males in separated flocks – and love open forests with nut trees like oak (acorns are their favorite food!), hickory or beech, with interspersed clearings such as fields, swamps, roads or suburban areas. They use their strong feet to scratch leaf litter out of the way searching for nuts, berries, insects, salamanders and snails. They sometimes climb into shrubs or low trees for fruits or dig for plant bulbs. Like most birds, they swallow grit to help digest their food. Wild Turkeys get around mostly by walking, though they can also run and fly, and even swim by kicking in the water! When threatened, females tend to fly while males tend to run. At sundown, turkeys fly into the lower limbs of trees and move upward from limb to limb to a high roost spot, therefore avoiding their nocturnal predators, which include coyotes, bobcats, raccoons, mountain lions and Great Horned Owls.

The typical gobbling sound of the Wild Turkey is the male's call to attract females and warn competing males. In Spring, in addition to preforming their call, males will proudly strut with puffed out feathers, fanned tail, swollen face wattles, and drooped wings, while rattling their wing feathers and making humming sounds. One male will mate with several females and provide no parental care. After mating, the female will scratch a shallow depression at the base of a tree and line it with plant materials already present at the nest site. There, she will usually lay 10-15 eggs and incubate them for about a month. The downy chicks are able to leave the nest soon after hatching, but the female tends them and broods them at night for several weeks. Newly hatched chicks follow the female, who feeds them for a few days until they learn to find food on their own. As the chicks grow, they band into groups composed of several hens and their broods, forming impressive groups sometimes exceeding 200 turkeys.

The Wild Turkey was named a bird of courage by founding father Benjamin Franklin in 1784. A story is told that Franklin would have preferred the Wild Turkey, not the Bald Eagle, chosen as the national symbol of the United States. As a matter of fact, although the barnyard variety is a rather stupid creature, the original wild form is a wary and magnificent bird.
