

SSC Solar Power Project Report by Jim Dale, Harbormaster

Mid Valley Power completed the installation of 232 panels on the roof top of the Stockton Sailing Club's warehouse building on the North side of the property in early August. Once complete they requested the necessary clearances from Stockton Fire, City and PGE. City of Stockton and the Fire Department have signed off. Currently SSC is only waiting on PGE to sign off. The panels are ready to produce and just in time. The PGE electric bill in July was a record \$14,000 for the month. It was up from just under \$10,000 in 2023 for the same month.



Once in production the solar package is expected to produce enough electricity to save the SSC about \$50,000 annually. It could be more as rates are increased by PGE. Once the system is active the contractor will assist the office in requesting a rebate from the Federal Government; the rebate is expected to be about \$126,000. In total the SSC's solar project cost just under \$400,000 and there was a roof project done of about \$105,000. The roof project was likely to occur with or without the solar panels due to the buildings age.

Calculating the rebate, not including the roof project, its feasible the clubwill enjoy an 18% return on investment for the solar project. This depends on the panels final production, PGE rates and its likely to be less in the winter then in summer months.



SSC 2024 Learn-to-Sail Report by Ashley Ragon



This summer, students and coaches returned to the water to hold this year's sessions of Learn to Sail. Over the course of six weeks, a little over 100 students participated in this year's program. Ashley Ragon, Mindy Claypool, and Trevin Brown led the program with Cooper Brink assisting as an intern for part of the summer. Almost every week had a morning session and an afternoon session, most sessions being full or near full. LTS continued to be a half-day program this summer, allowing for more students to come through the program and more productive classes. The program ran Monday through Friday each week, starting the second week of June and ending the second to last week of July, excluding the week of the 4th of July.

Many students this summer included returners who were eager to get back on the water. New students introduced to sailing this year thoroughly enjoyed the program and their time on the water on hot summer days. Many new students enrolled for more weeks, some even returning for two or three more sessions. These students were full of excitement and had a lot of fun in the program as they look forward to returning to LTS next year.

Each day, the coaches prepared a new lesson plan to effectively teach each group based on their abilities and the changing conditions on the water. Mondays most often consisted of classroom instruction, covering most of the basics of dinghy sailing. Students learned knots, boat parts, rigging, tacking, points of sail, and participated in the capsize drill. Jolly Ranchers were, once again, used as a prize for many activities or an

incentive to engaged participation. Tues-



days and Wednesdays included free sailing and a trip down to the statue of liberty near the port. Students focused on learning to sail upwind and typically had the skill down by the second half of Wednesday's session. On Thursdays, LTS held a classic event: the Opti Olympics. Competitions included knot tying, rigging, relay races, individual races, and derigging races. If the group had time, they also participated in paddle races. At the end of the session, points were tallied up. The winner received a junior t-shirt with first through third place receiving Jolly Ranchers, once again. Fridays included a trip to Ski Beach to enjoy the sunny weather and play in the water and sand. Students sailed upwind until they

were towed to allow for sufficient time on the beach.

This year's program once again brought a fun summer to the coaches and students. The coaches look forward to bringing another successful summer back next year. While Trevin Brown is moving on from the program, the other coaches are excited for next year. The program is currently looking for new coaches to add to the program's instructors. This year's program taught many students the basics of dinghy sailing and introduced many to the junior sailing program. This would not have been possible without the generous support of Richard Wright and many other club members who contributed to the program's success.

2024 Coastal Clean Up by Faye Roberts

Ahoy members!!! We have an event coming up next month that can make a difference to our waterways. On September 21 we will meet at the club house parking lot to converge on litter on our grounds, marina and outside the gates. Heaven knows we are a club with a conscience to put trash in its place, no matter how it got there.

The International Coastal Cleanup is going on 50 years, the California Coastal Cleanup is 40 years and SJ County is celebrating 25 years. At the SSC, I think we have done it off and on for over 10 years, but don't quote me. I haven't kept the stats, but we have picked up at least a few hundred pounds with at least 15-20 members volunteering each year. It's not everybody's cup of tea to pick up trash but it does turn out to be a feel good day.

Come with hats, gloves, (there will be latex gloves but I find garden/work gloves work best), sunscreen, and closed toe shoes. We will have water (but maybe bring your own refillable bottle. Have you seen our bottle station in front of the ground floor bathrooms?) buckets, some long handle tools and a few pick up sticks. If you are really into doing trash pickup, TOUGH GUY Trash Grabber: Trigger Handle, 32" are sold by Grainger. They are the best and easiest on the hands. There will be swag and t shirts for those who volunteer.

The hours are 9-12. I need to report our pickups by 1PM to the County Public Works. In order to expedite the numbers there are tally sheets to be used. It's best if people work in pairs or threes, one to keep the tally and one or more to pick up. The county gives a prize for the strangest item picked up. This year, I will have a prize for the strangest item, decided by the volunteers who helped.


are exaggerated. They're not (too much).


Don't miss out next year. It's grand to be part of the chaos. There is so much satisfaction in being part of this historic event. You will be proud of the Stockton Sailing Club.
