The Commodore's Column By Pam Wright

Greetings SSC Members and Friends,

As we set sail into the new season, our club continues to thrive with camaraderie, dedication, and a shared love for sailing. The recent months have been filled with memorable events, from our annual Lighted Boat Parade to the inspiring Evening of Aloha fundraiser. Let's continue to build on this momentum and make the upcoming season even more remarkable.

In 1966 the members of the Stockton Sailing Club needed a small crane for the boat yard. The membership formed a "Century Club" to allow members to donate one hundred dollars to the club for the crane. It was successful.

Funds to improve the boat yard and build the Club House was accomplished by giving members a Bond, allowing the members to loan money to the club. Some Bonds were paid off annually by lottery. All Bonds were paid off in seven years.

In 1974 the Stockton Sailing Club purchased the entire South Buckley Cove facility and City lease for four hundred thousand dollars. Bonds were issued to the membership to raise one hundred thousand dollars. The remaining amount was loans from two financial institutions. The members were paid back in nine years. The "Mortgage" was completed in 1998.


Now the Stockton Sailing Club faces another expensive purchase, a brand-new elevator for the Club House. The cost is possibly forty thousand dollars to fifty thousand dollars.

It is probably not necessary to explain the need for an elevator. But here are some of the people who are affected every time they attempt to enter the clubhouse. There are members of age who struggle, members with physical challenges, members with appliances, members with items in their arms, members with very young children, and our staff supplying the Club House. We do have a certificated lift chair located at the rear of the club house. But, it is a backup for emergencies and does not meet the club needs.

Your 2025 Board voted unanimously May 13th to advance the process of issuing "Members' Bonds", allowing the members to loan money to the Club. This is the historic moment. A Special Meeting of the Board of Directors has been called by the Commodore for May 25th. Discussion will be preparing a Special Election to ask the members' permission to offer the Members' Bond". A Ballot will be prepared. The Board is carefully following our Bylaws for such an occasion. This will be a mail-in Ballot. We will need approximately 140 members to return Ballots to meet the Bylaw percentage of our membership.

We respect our members, and we know they are committed to the Stockton Sailing Club and spend many hours here enjoying the club and the site. We are the stewards of the club, and this moment has come to ask +us to keep the club for future sailors as others kept it for us.
